Here we are... Holy Week. We worshiped on Palm Sunday, welcoming the King of Kings with palm branches and calls of 'Hosanna.' But we all knew what was ahead for us... and for Jesus.

It's very exciting to welcome someone. Recently, we had two separate visits from family. We could hardly wait for them to arrive! But before we knew it, they were gone.
