- "The Lord makes me lie down"—I need not dwell on <u>Expectations</u> that keep me a slave to trying to get things the way I want them to be. Getting mired in <u>Expectations</u> only makes me chase the things that are not important and evaluate each as a "success" or "failure." I need to be humble and give up that frustrating scurry to find meaning when it's not there and lie down and rest and be open to <u>Receive</u> the Grace of God. Grace brings "success" every time.
- "The Lord leads me beside still waters"—Why do I continue to embrace and get caught up in the roiling turmoil of the stress and strife of the raging waters of living that get stirred up through constant <u>Worry?</u> Once you <u>Accept</u> what you have and are grateful for it, you will be led to the peace and stillness of life that allows you to truly <u>Enjoy</u> it.
- "He restores my soul"—I think it restores my spirit down into the depths of me when I can turn over these wants and <u>Expectations</u> and <u>Worries</u> to Him so I am free to be <u>Accepting</u> and can <u>Receive</u> and truly <u>Enjoy</u> the life he has given me.
- "He leads me in the right paths"—When I see it front of me and can believe it's really a path there ahead for me, I can walk it more easily and I can actually see that it's much more "right" for me. It doesn't mean I am a more righteous or

better person than another, but I think it means I can see how to take some of the pressure off myself to do that by letting myself be guided toward the "right" path for me.
